Saturday Morning Farmers Market goes year-round

Redlands residents looking for fresh, local winter produce need look no further than the City's historic downtown. In January the City's successful Saturday Morning Certified Farmers Market began operating year-round.

The Saturday Morning Certified Farmers' Market originally began June 6, 2009, bringing local growers to the City parking lot south of Redlands Boulevard between Fifth and Sixth streets near Ed Hales Park. The market initially operated seasonally, through the spring and summer.

Since ending for the season last September, however, local interest in a year-round Farmers Market, providing fresh fall and winter produce, remained strong. Recently, the City, the Downtown Redlands Business Association and the market's other sponsors made a decision to begin operating the market all year long.

City of Redlands Recognizes Employees of the Year

Nine City employees received awards as Employee or Manager of the Year at “An Afternoon with the Stars,” the City of Redlands third annual employee recognition on Oct. 28. In addition, the City awarded its first Volunteer/Intern of the Year award during the lunchtime event. Another 86 employees were recognized for service to the City ranging from 5 to 30 years and nine recent retirees were also recognized.

In recognition of a tough economy, the City’s Human Resources Department and a committee made up of employees from various City departments scaled the event down from previous years. The event was held at City Hall during most employees’ lunch hour, rather than an evening event as in previous years. At its Dec. 21 meeting, the City Council approved a proposal to operate the Farmer's Market every Saturday, from 6 a.m. to noon, excluding holiday weekends, beginning Jan. 8.

The Saturday Morning Certified Farmers Market began as an expansion of the City's successful Market Night, which, in addition to a variety of merchants and entertainers, brings local growers to State Street every Thursday night. Tens of thousands of residents and out of town visitors come to the Thursday night market every year.

The Saturday Morning Certified Farmer's Market provides an additional venue for local growers, and a source of fresh produce for residents and visitors. As an added benefit, the Saturday Morning Certified Farmers Market brings new customers to the historic downtown district where they can enjoy the unique shops and restaurants along State Street and the surrounding area. Over the spring and summer, many local restaurants opened their doors early on Saturday morning to accommodate the additional customers.

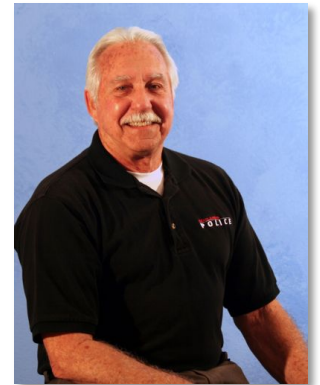
Coming events at the Lincoln Shrine

February is traditionally the busiest month at the Lincoln Memorial Shrine. 2011 should be especially active as it will mark the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the American Civil War. At our 39th annual open house Sunday, Feb. 6, the Lincoln Shrine will unveil a new special exhibit entitled "And the war came..." focusing on the first year of the Civil War, 1861. The exhibit will feature rare artwork, manuscripts and artifacts about President Lincoln, his generals and the common soldiers of the North and South, all designed to demonstrate the dramatic events of the first year of the conflict. The open house, which doubles as a Lincoln birthday celebration, begins at 11 a.m. and runs until 3 p.m. and will feature Civil War re-enactors, a musical quartet and an appearance by a Lincoln presenter. Admission is free. On Saturday, Feb. 12, the 79th rendition of the Watchorn Lincoln Memorial Association dinner will take place at the University of Redlands Orton Center. The 2011 version of this tradition will feature Mr. James Swanson, best-selling author of "Manhunt", who will be talking about the Lincoln assassination. City Council establishes list of Core Values

After soliciting and receiving input from city staff, city boards and commissions, the City Council approved a new set of City Core Values at the Dec. 21 City Council session.

Spearheaded by Council Member Bob Gardner, the new core values outline basic principles on how the Council, other elected officials, and City staff and volunteers will conduct City business. It is anticipated that these will serve as a foundation as the City moves forward to update the mission and vision statements, and the identification and prioritization of City goals. The 10 core values are as follows:

- We strive for excellence and innovation
- We are fiscally responsible
- We seek sustainability
- We are responsive
- We are fair, honest, and act with integrity
- We are accountable and make sound decisions based on clear rationale
- We treat everyone with respect
- We embrace diversity and inclusiveness
- We communicate openly, clearly, and frequently
- We take pleasure in the work that we do

The City will develop a training session reinforcing these principles, which will be provided to all staff members early in 2011.

New City Council members sworn into office

Two new members of the Redlands City Council were sworn in and a new Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem chosen following citywide elections in November.

Paul Foster and Bob Gardner were sworn in as the newest members of the Redlands City Council Tuesday, Dec. 7, replacing outgoing Council members Pat Gilbreath and Mick Gallagher.

Councilman Jon Harrison won reelection to a second term on the City Council.

Following the swearing in ceremony and seating of the new Council, the members chose a new Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem.

Council Member Pete Aguilar was unanimously selected to serve as Mayor for the next two years. Council Member Foster was also selected unanimously to serve as Mayor Pro Tem.

Harrison, Foster and Gardner will each serve four-year terms, ending in 2014. The next City Council election will take place in 2012.

A ballot measure to add a half-cent sales tax was defeated in the November election, as was a measure to change the City Treasurer position from an elected to an appointed office.

New City Council Meeting Schedule

The City Council recently changed its meeting schedule to allow greater participation by residents. Public meetings, which had been at 3 p.m., will now begin at 6 p.m., starting with Public Comments on items that are not on the agenda. The new meeting schedule will begin with the Feb. 15, 2011 City Council meeting.

City, businesses urge residents to Shop Local

The City of Redlands and the Redlands Independent Business Owners have joined to promote the 3/50 Project, a campaign to educate consumers on the impact of their spending habits.

Just \$50 spent each month at each of three local businesses can have a tremendous impact on the local economy and City services. Studies show that for every \$100 spent at a locally-owned business, \$68 is returned to the

local economy, while only \$43 comes back to the local economy when \$100 is spent at a big box or chain store.

Local sales tax dollars fund City services such as Police and Fire response, street maintenance and repairs, park maintenance and a variety of other services.

City vies for seventh straight award-winning financial report

After many hours of staff time over several months, in December the Finance Department completed the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the Year Ended June 30, 2010 and submitted it to the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) to determine its eligibility for award of a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting.

The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting and represents a significant achievement for the Finance Department.

GFOA established the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting Award Program in 1945 to encourage and assist state and local governments to go beyond the minimum requirements of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) to prepare comprehensive annual financial reports that evidence the spirit of transparency and full disclosure and then to recognize individual governments that succeed in achieving that goal.

There are 17 grading categories included in

the evaluation. (Submittals for award are due by Dec. 31 for the prior fiscal year audit.) The City has received the Certificate of Achievement for each of its Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports for the periods ending June 30, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009. The City will be notified in July 2011 if it is successful in receiving the award for the Fiscal Year 2009-2010 CAFR.

In addition to the CAFR, the Finance Department staff also completed the Redevelopment Agency Financial Statements and other major reports due to the State, including the City State Controller's Report, due in October and the RDA State Controller's Report, due Dec. 31, 2010, along with the Housing and Community Development Report of Redevelopment Agency Housing Activity. An annual report that includes all RDA reports and a schedule of RDA property has been provided to the Agency Board via a memorandum dated Dec. 23, 2010, in accordance with the State Community Redevelopment Law, which requires the report be filed with the Board within six months of the end of the fiscal year.

During December the Revenue Division of the Finance Department sent out 3, 626 business license renewals.

Projects for 2011 will beautify, connect and energize

Beginning early this year, the Municipal Utilities and Engineering Department (MUED) will embark on a number of projects in the city which will enhance connectivity, beautify its appearance and deliver a renewable source of energy. These projects will incorporate funds from a variety of sources including the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 to bring these welcome changes to the City's current infrastructure.

MUED will begin 2011 with a heavy focus on ensuring pedestrian accessibility through four different sidewalk projects. The first project is funded through a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) which will construct approximately 8,200 linear feet of sidewalks and 49 handicap accessible ADA curb ramps to the designated CDBG area east of the 210 freeway.

The second project which is also funded through CDBG, was the City's allocation from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. This project will construct approximately an additional 1,100 linear feet of sidewalk to the designated CDBG area.

The third and fourth sidewalk projects are funded through State (Caltrans) Safe Routes to School Program Grants. Cycle 5 will construct approximately 5,400 linear feet of sidewalk and 107 handicap accessible ADA curb ramps around nine designated public elementary schools, two high schools and two private schools. Cycle 6 will construct approximately nine handicap accessible ADA curb ramps, three crosswalks and six flashing beacons around three designated public middle schools.

MUED will also begin two different street resurfacing projects which will bring needed enhancements to the City's roadways. The first is the Church, Alessandro, Center Resurfacing project. This project is funded through Proposition 1B funds, as well as Traffic Congestion Relief Funds. The project will

resurface with rubberized asphalt 15,000 road feet or almost three miles of City streets. Additionally, the project will also fund the construction or refurbishment of 60 ADA curb ramps. The second project is the City's 2009-2010 Street Resurfacing Project. The project is funded through a Cal Recycle Grant and through Measure I funds. The paving project will occur in various road segments of the City and will resurface approximately eight miles of City streets.

In an effort to continue to provide more recreational areas and to beautify the City, MUED will also embark on the Terrace Park Improvement Project. The project will bring new landscaping to half of the existing park, upgrade approximately 1,700 linear feet of the existing trail in the park and install ADA curb ramps and sidewalks at the east and west entrance to the park.

MUED will also implement a "greening" of one of their own facilities through the installation of a photovoltaic array. This photovoltaic array will provide a renewable energy source through the use of solar panels, which when constructed will supply power to the City's wastewater treatment plant. As a result, the City will become less reliant on power from Edison. Funding for the construction of this project comes through an allocation grant from the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Program, another American Recovery and Reinvestment Act fund. An additional source of funding for the photovoltaic array will come in the form of the California Solar Incentive Program. This program has allocated up to \$250,000 worth of rebates based on the levels of energy produced by the photovoltaic array over the first five years of its existence.



City allocates \$900K in federal funds for energy efficiency

The City Council in December allocated \$900,000 in federal funds for energy efficiency that will be used to upgrade lighting as well as heating, ventilation and cooling (HVAC) systems in a number of City facilities.

The federal funding from the 2010 Energy and Water Development and other Related Agencies Appropriations Act was awarded to the City in September and will be used to upgrade or replace HVAC systems in the A.K. Smiley Public Library, the Redlands Community Senior Center, Fire Station No. 3 and the Redlands City Yards as well as lighting in the City's parking garage at 35 Cajon St. and 120 E. Citrus.

The HVAC upgrades are expected to save the City more than 40 percent in heating and cooling costs in those facilities, adding up to approximately \$46,000 per year. The savings will also substantially reduce peak energy demand on the community's power grid.

Lighting retrofits are expected to result in between 30 and 75 percent reduction in lighting costs in the parking garages, depending on usage.

The factors that went into selection included the number of employees and patrons using the facilities as well as the projections for energy and cost savings, among other considerations.

The federal grant required a dollar-for-dollar City match. The City was able to use previously planned projects from the City's Water Projects Fund to meet the \$900,000 match requirements. Those projects included energy efficiency upgrades to wells, pumps, motors and delivery systems of the City's water production and distribution operations. Those upgrades will save almost a million watts of energy demand.

RPD is test bed for turning iPhone into crime fighting tool

The Redlands Police Department is helping to develop a new law enforcement specific application for the iPhone, thanks to a grant from the National Institute of Justice, Office of Justice Programs.

In October, the City Council voted to accept the two-year, \$473,161 NIJ cooperative agreement to develop an iPhone based crime mapping application for law enforcement.

The Redlands Police Department will partner with George Mason University near Washington, D.C. to ensure that the evaluation of the application is conducted in a scientifically rigorous manner. Researchers from Temple University, the Police Executive Research Forum and John Jay College of Criminal Justice will also provide assistance.

The advent and rise of computerized crime mapping and analysis techniques has gone a long way toward developing analytic capabilities within police departments. These tools, however, have often focused on desktop users or have been distributed in formats incompatible with the highly mobile nature of law enforcement.

The research project seeks to turn the iPhone into a powerful tool that will give officers the ability to quickly identify and react to changing crime trends, identify crime hot spots and share intelligence information more easily in the field. This program will take advantage of the enhanced multimedia capabilities of the iPhone to address the needs of law enforcement officers.

This project will be carried out and managed by the Redlands Police Department over two years. Ultimately the project is intended to provide the National Institute of Justice and law enforcement agencies around the country with a crime mapping and analysis application that turns the iPhone into a mobile analytic tool and a detailed report on how specific law enforcement needs can be met with an iPhone based solution.
