### FIELD SERVICES DIVISION

#### Patrol

On Feb. 11 a late report of theft at a business, in the 100 block of East State Street, was made. While employees were stocking shelves, the suspect entered the business and stole items from an employee, and cash from a desk. A security video was taken of the suspect, and a positive identification of the suspect was made, through a photo line up. Several attempts were made to contact the suspect at former residences, but he was not found. The investigation is continuing.

On Feb. 7 an attempted robbery was reported. The victim, a pizza delivery driver, was approached by the would-be robber, as he was making a delivery in the 1600 block of Orange Street. The suspect displayed a knife and demanded money from the delivery driver. The driver grabbed a baseball bat from his vehicle and the robber ran away, without the money. The suspect description was given to police, and an identi-kit composite was made. It appeared that the suspect could be connected to a previous robbery that occurred on Jan. 27 in the 1700 block of Orange Street.

On Feb. 5, while checking a pedestrian, in the 1200 block of Citrus, an officer found the 20-year-old male to be in possession of three spray-paint cans, a respirator mask, and a latex glove. The neighborhood was checked and fresh graffiti was found in an alleyway, with various gang names, one being "NYC." The subject stopped was found to be a student at the U of R, from New York. Personnel from the MET unit responded, and took over the investigation.

On Feb. 3 police were on a residential burglary in the 100 block of Jennifer, that occurred during the night, while the residents were asleep. The suspect entered through an unlocked downstairs window and then went upstairs, where money was removed from a purse. The suspect went through several desk draws and then left the residence at the same point of entry. Fingerprints were located on the windowsill, and other forensics evidence was found in the residence. The investigation is continuing.

On Feb.2 two Redlands Police Cadets were enroute to a car burglary, in the area of Ford and South Street, when they observed a suspicious vehicle in the area. They reported the vehicle to dispatch, and kept the vehicle in sight until patrol units could make a car stop. Once officers stopped the vehicle, they located several stolen items inside the car, including property from the car burglary the cadets were assigned.

#### West Community Policing Station

Motor Officer Derik Ohlson worked the Lincoln Pilgrimage Parade on Feb. 10, in addition to his regular traffic enforcement duties.

#### Downtown Community Policing Station

Feb. 5 - Collision at Eureka and Redlands Boulevard resulting in a person injured and transported to the hospital. A vehicle going eastbound blew the signal and hit a vehicle going southbound. PCO handled traffic control with CVP called in for more assistance to block off intersections.

The week of Feb. 5- 9 the Redlands Police Department hosted a Basic School Resource Officer school. On Feb. 7 from 10 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. Officer Steve Smith gave a presentation to the class on California Law relating to minors. During this presentation Officer Smith covered Vehicle Code, Penal Code, Education Code, Business and Professions Code and Health and Safety Code that pertain to minors and adults on and around schools. The class was attended by School Resource Officers from all over California as well as from New Mexico.

Feb. 9 – Motor officers worked the canyon between San Timoteo and Refuse Road. They stopped at least 40 vehicles and cited approximately 25 of the drivers for going around barricades and moving the cones to go around. They worked from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Feb. 10 - Cpl. Les Jolly, motor officers a CVP assisted to help make the Lincoln Parade a success. There were approximately 500 citizens watching the parade.

#### Orange Street Community Policing Station

Sgt. Travis Martinez and Erin Sanborn have been teaching the Parent Project.

Sgt. Martinez assisted MET in the investigation of a tagger who left a spray can at the scene of the crime. CSO Ashley Campos lifted latent prints that came back to an adult in Loma Linda. He was arrested and confessed to the tagging.

### **Code Enforcement**

During the period of Feb. 1-14, 10 code enforcement inspections were conducted throughout the neighborhoods of Redlands located on the north side of Interstate 10.

Nine new cases were opened during this period and eight cases were closed. There are currently 357 active code enforcement cases at the Orange Street substation.

### **East Community Policing Station**

#### **CRIME INTERVENTION BUREAU** **MULTIPLE ENFORCEMENT TEAM**

MET conducted SRT training at the SBSO range practicing shooting and CQB tactical skills.

Officers reviewed four ABC licenses and forwarded findings to the captain.

MET assisted the PACT team with Parolee check in. The team completed gang cards on 13 parole gang members.

Officers assisted SBSO homicide with gang intelligence.

MET conducted numerous tobacco compliance checks (we have a list of businesses selling tobacco products and will keep track of locations/dates/status of our checks).

Officers Eddie Herrera and Jacinto DeLeon received a fingerprint hit from a can of spray paint located during a graffiti clean up. They identified a suspect and obtained a search warrant for the suspect's home in Loma Linda. The team served the warrant with

evidence recovered indicating his moniker and other information. The following day the officers met with the suspect at WVDC. The suspect confessed to tagging and was sub-booked for felony vandalism.

MET began a new strategy to combat vehicle burglaries on the east side. They have used a combination of marked units and plain clothes officers on bicycles. The results have been numerous traffic stops and pedestrian checks.

Officers worked with investigations and spent most of an afternoon identifying and completing gang cards on 12 gang members.

After several nights of working a house in the 900 block of Washington Street, MET served a search warrant and arrested two subjects -- one for felony warrant for being out of compliance with his sex registrant terms and the second subject for possession of methamphetamine for sales with a loaded handgun.

On Saturday, Feb. 3, Redlands Drug Court participants finished work on the Glass Museum.

Redlands Drug Court has reached capacity at 85 in active treatment in Redlands, three receiving treatment out of the area within an in-patient program and 15 subjects who have absconded. There are 76 probation-only subjects who are also being supervised by Probation Officer Rob Gines and Officer Stan McCauley. Probation Officer Rob Gines is currently working on transferring all probation-only subjects to other caseloads. In doing so, Probation Officer Rob Gines and Officer Stan McCauley will be able to concentrate all efforts on active Drug Court participants.

Officer Stan McCauley and Probation Officer Rob Gines have re-started the Work Group and Saturday Community Service projects. Drug Court participants have already helped in many community projects and have plans for future projects.

Probation Officer Rob Gines and Officer Stan McCauley continue to give Investigative Service Bureau vital information regarding ongoing investigations.

Several 3056 holds, return to custody, were placed on parolees over the past two weeks by the PACT agents for patrol officers.

CSR Laurie Kutch conducted a training class for the Juvenile Care Room volunteers. Five new volunteers were added to the dispatch call-out list.

Step-by-Step held its monthly meeting on Feb. 6. CSR Kutch attended the hygiene kit assembly on Feb. 8, helping to assemble more than 30 kits for parolees.

CSR Kutch will be working with CSO Patty McGowan to separate bikes out of evidence which can be used for a bicycle clinic within the next three months.

Tattoo removal continues with much success. Several parolees have come forward who want to change their lifestyles and have their gang tattoos removed. Humble Enhancements has offered their services at a very low cost in order to assist those who want to start over.

## NARCOTIC UNIT

The team served a search warrant in San Bernardino. One went to jail for possession of methamphetamine for sale and long-formed the other two suspects that were not home.

The team set up two delivery rip-offs but they did not go.

The team made several controlled buys the last couple of weeks with warrants to follow.

The team had Yucaipa deputies make a traffic stop for us. They arrested the male for warrants and the female parolee for possession of methamphetamine for sales.

The team served a search warrant in San Bernardino and took five to jail for warrants and one for possession of methamphetamine for sales.

The Yucaipa deputies made another stop and took a female parolee to jail for possession of methamphetamine for sales.

The team conducted a knock-and-talk in Redlands and took one female to jail for possession of methamphetamine for sales.

The team did a few knock and talks in Redlands and several surveillance in their area of responsibility.

The Redlands officers from the team spent a day in court for sales cases.

## INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES BUREAU

Detectives were called out for a rape investigation. The rape was unfounded, however two juveniles were cited for unlawful sexual intercourse.

An attempted armed robbery of a pizza delivery driver is being investigated. The victim was making a delivery, when he was approached by a man who displayed a knife and demanded money. The suspect fled after the victim grabbed a baseball bat out of his vehicle. The suspect is described as a Hispanic male, approximately 20 years old, 5 feet, 10 inches tall, 150 pounds, with a goatee. This description is similar to one given of another pizza delivery driver that was robbed at knife point last month.

The police were notified of a subject who had pyrotechnic equipment at his residence. Detectives responded, along with the Bomb Squad from the Sheriff's Department. A search warrant was issued, and more than 500 lbs of explosives were confiscated. The resident was taken into custody.

Charges were filed against a burglary suspect who was in custody at the Banning Detention Center. Fingerprints taken from a burglary scene in Redlands, came back to the suspect. During the interview, the suspect admitted to taking a TV, and indicated where it could be located. The TV was recovered at a residence in Hesperia, and returned to the victim in Redlands.

A warrant is being sought in the Girl Scout building burglary. Two suspects have already been arrested. A third suspect has been identified and the case sent to the DA's office for a warrant.

Three subjects were arrested for stealing equipment from landscapers. The suspects would approach the victims' vehicles, take their equipment, then flee in their own vehicle. Five cases were cleared by this arrest. Property was recovered from three of the cases.

Fingerprints located inside of a stolen vehicle belong to a parolee, who is in custody at West Valley Detention Center. The suspect was interviewed at West Valley where he was booked for the additional charge of Grand Theft Auto.

A subject was arrested for passing a fraudulent check at a check cashing business in Redlands. The suspect was identified by video from the store, and identified further with a photo line up.

A suspect was identified for possession and completing stolen checks. The victim, who is in Arizona, was able to identify the suspect via a photo line up.

A 32-year-old female from Highland was arrested for grand theft from a department store. ID was made via store video, and witness statements.

### **PUBLIC INFORMATION UNIT**

On Feb. 7, Public Information Officer Carl Baker responded to Los Robles Crest where a resident had stored explosives and was manufacturing fireworks. Carl handled media requests from the local newspapers as well as TV crews from KCBS/KCAL, Spanish language TV station Telemundo and a freelance video reporter.

Carl finished up the planning for the Seventh Annual Faith and Justice Summit, which was held Feb. 15 at Trinity Evangelical Free Church.

Carl attended the steering committee meeting planning the Citywide Cleanup and Celebration and Redlands Adopt-A-Street program.

## **RECREATION**

Staff applied for recognition from the United States Tennis Association to become a designated "Tennis in the Park" City. This means the City will strive to bring about youth and adult tennis through the use of one of its facilities. Staff is presently working with a donor to rehabilitate the tennis courts at Clement Middle School. The USTA also offers construction grants for renovations of existing facilities, once designated as a Tennis in the Park City.

Chief Jim Bueermann held the first session of Leadership University with the fulltime staff of recreation. Leadership University is a term the Chief coined for in-house staff and leadership development training sessions. Presently, recreation will hold six, two-hour training sessions on topics from Situational Leadership to Conflict Resolution. Captain Tom Fitzmaurice will be instructing Session II.

The Community Center received an upgrade to an old security camera VHS recording system that was no longer working. It was replaced with a remote DVR at absolutely no cost to the city. The new DVR records up to five days of coverage and, in addition, the recording system software was also installed on the Reception Desk computer, so staff now has two monitors for the facility via four remote cameras at all times. Much thanks to Capt. Fitzmaurice, Lt. Russ Dalzell and Steve Lennartz for setting up the new system.

Staff is meeting with the Skate Park Committee. The Committee is dedicated to procuring the funding for the proposed skate park. The park is planned at the southwest corner of Sylvan Park on undeveloped land. The City Council has designated the land

to be used for a future skate park. The Committee has held two community design workshops and the design is nearing completion. The Committee is presently researching various grant and solicitation opportunities. The estimated cost of the project is approximately \$650,000. The Committee currently has \$52,000.

### Community Center

The Community Center is preparing for Spring 2007! Event planning has begun with the Annual Easter Egg Hunt around the corner and Movies in the Park shortly after that. Staff has been making proper reservations, planning, ordering and preparations for the events.

### **Adult Volleyball**

Adult Volleyball began registration for the Spring 2007 Season on Feb. 1.

### **Winter Intro Soccer**

Intro Soccer ended really well with an intense World Cup, delicious Soccer Cupcakes, team photos and Award Medals. Staff did a great job coordinating the clinic and the highly anticipated World Cup that ended in a very fair tie game.

### **Kid's World**

Kid's World has been busy and lots of things keeping them on their toes. Staff has been in the process of updating and changing policies in order to keep up with the growth and dynamics of the program. A major change staff has made is focusing on homework to improve the grades of Kid's World participants.

**Youth Coalition/Teen Committee** - Had a meeting at the center on Friday, Feb.9, with 23 in attendance, SRO Michelle Maranan visited the meeting. The kids were awarded for their hours served and T-shirts given to official members. The training activity was telephones and customer service.

We had People to People Student Ambassadors come on Friday, Jan. 9, and host a Valentine Dance. Only 35 in attendance but everybody had a great time.

Computer Game Tournament had 25 in attendance on Friday, Feb. 2, and the Sun newspaper also joined us and wrote a story on the new recreation and how computer game tournaments and sport tournaments work side by side reaching all kids.

On Thursday, Feb. 7, Dave Jaffe and Theresa Lake met with the co-founder of XRtainment. Joel contacted us because of the article in the Sun. They have very creative ideas and want the community to be involved.

Friday Feb. 16, is Band Night. The band Split Veil will be playing.

**The Teen Council/Teen Forum** – Met Feb. 15 in the City Council Chambers. The topic was graffiti and the financial burden it places on businesses and the schools.
